Inquiry corner

In recent issues i have described parts of 'Inquiry Cycle', a way of organising our inquiry style teaching and learning. This page brings the cycle to a conclusion, as I describe the final two stages:


Making Conclusions

At the conclusion of a unit of inquiry students are given time to consider what they have learned. This reflection time allows them to think back to where they started, when they knew very little on the topic. They are asked to consider how their thinking has changed. What new knowledge have they gained? What skills have they practiced? What new perspectives do they see? These kinds of understanding come about through time spent quietly pondering what has been achieved. Quite often in traditional classrooms the teacher will close a lesson by telling the students what was just covered in the lesson. However, this kind of 'Making Conclusions' involves engaging the student in deep self reflection in order to consider what was new and personal learning for each one of them. A student who draws their own conclusions demonstrates a deep level of understanding and engagement.

Taking Action

When students have drawn their conclusions, ultimately they should be in a good position to take action on something they have learned. Deep conceptual understanding of an issue or topic will lead students into actually doing something about what they have learned. Simple examples include; choosing to cut down on junk food after a unit on health, reusing plastic bags and bottles after a unit on caring for the environment, or after a unit on pollution students might feel they need to ask parents to walk with them to school occasionally, rather than always using the car.

Taking Action is a key part of learning in the PYP. When students are passionate about their learning it will naturally lead them into wanting to take action. Our aim is to support students towards doing something good for the benefit of themselves and their community.
