Primary Years Update

Hi everyone! In our UOI the students have been continuing with their focus on local/global sustainability. We have been looking at the issues of poverty and how everyone can make a difference to help those less fortunate than ourselves. We have also been planting different varieties of seeds and flowers and observing and recording their growth. Our balcony garden is looking fantastic and the students have worked really hard on this project.

In numeracy, Year 1 has been focusing on time, counting patterns that involve time, and reading schedules. We will finish up this concept with a project on schedules on Friday. For Year 2, we have been looking at division and multiplication. Students have been practising and consolidating their skills in their

math stations by using counters and other objects together with their counting charts.

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In English, both Year 1 and Year 2 will been continuing with our journal writing and linking it in with our UOI on the environment. Students have also been learning new vocabulary associated with the UOI, Health Month and various types of food from around the world.

Year 3 and 4 finishes up its unit, "How we express ourselves"

Math has been very good as the students have reached a much higher level of comprehension with numbers. They have really understood fractions and decimals and are able to order them on a number line. They have worked through some very difficult concepts for themselves.

Language and Culture

Let the Kids Learn Through Play By Miss Nat, Head Thai Teacher

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TWENTY years ago, kids spent much of their time playing: building with blocks, drawing or creating imaginary worlds, in their own heads or with classmates. But increasingly, these activities are being abandoned for the teacher-led, didactic instruction typically used in higher grades.

...scientists, education researchers and educators say there is little evidence that this approach improves long-term achievement; in fact, it may have the opposite effect, potentially slowing emotional and cognitive development, causing unnecessary stress and perhaps even souring kids' desire to learn.

I wanted to share this quote from an article I have read recently. From my experience as a Thai language teacher, this relates to how children best learn language. Language needs to be taught organically rather than by dictated instruction. When children enjoy learning and can connect to their learning they will not only remember the new language but they will use it in their lives. When children are taught by teachers dictating instruction and worksheets the children are not fully aware of what they are doing and will soon forget the lesson. Here at UDIS, students in Thai class learn language through stories and making connections to the world around them.
