### A Concept-Based Curriculum

What is the purpose of a concept-based curriculum? Many of the jobs that our students do during their careers have not yet been invented. Technological advances create new opportunities and our students need to have the mental flexibility to be able to work in a constantly developing employment market.

The benefit of a concept-based curriculum is that these ideas transcend time and space and can be applied in various fields. The **key concepts** of the PYP are fundamental ideas that can be applied across the curriculum and each one has a question that relates to it. The concepts are Causation, Change, Connection, Form, Function, Perspective, Reflection and Responsibility.

For each Unit of Inquiry, two or three concepts will be selected and these will be applied to the learning throughout those weeks. For example, if a Unit's concepts were Form, Function and Change, the key questions would be: What is it? How does it work? How does it change? Thus the students explore these ideas and develop deeper understanding throughout their studies.

## Early Years Update

This week we welcome our new friend Licha who will be joining us for the remainder of the academic year. We are looking forward to sharing many wonderful learning experiences together.

K1 have been utilising the whole classroom as a rich learning environment, developing their interests and abilities in many different curriculum areas.

Continuous interests have been; creating intricate train tracks, building extravagant block constructions and role play cooking in the home corner.



During these experiences children are developing dispositions of teamwork, sharing and problem solving. Also developing their fine motor skills, creative imagination, and positive relationships from reciprocal, respectful social interactions.

In circle time we have also been learning new rhymes and songs in which children are developing

an understanding of direction, actions, and rhythm. Our new favourite is a hand rhyme called 'open, shut them,' which your children will be able to share with you :)







## A Class Act

K2 have been looking at texturing and embossing techniques, as well looking at how we looking at different techniques for decorating glass. We also tried our hand at making foam mosaic frames to help students practice before using real mosaic tiles. Having learned so many different techniques it has been great to watch students re-use these in different ways. K2 has definitely learned to be more creative and self expressive.



We made our own Zen gardens after discussing what the different patterns

in the sand of a Zen garden can mean as well as the different items we put in there. Students created a colour and shape mood board, choosing their own representations for each emotion. This art therapy technique is a great way to encourage children to be more self expressive and also to understand more about the emotions they are feeling.

We also looked at Batic painting and students started to create work and designs for their final project.



### Primary Years Update

In our UOI we have been investigating life cycles and how plants and animals adapt to their various environments. We have been looking at a savannah and investigating how plants and animals adapt to a hostile environment and what they have to do to survive. We have been comparing plants in colder countries to plants in warmer countries and comparing and contrasting them. We have also been working hard on our life cycles which is due for completion this Friday.



In Numeracy we have been very busy with testing which should be completed by this Friday. The students have worked very hard this year and its great to see them doing so well. We have also been working on our Busy Ants including

topics such as adding and subtracting two digit numbers using the expanded written method and solving addition and subtraction problems using various strategies.



In Literacy we have been working on our journal writing topics linked

whenever possible to our UOI. The students have also been rehearsing for their play the 9 little pigs and helping to make the props and face masks. We have also been working on our reading and writing strategies.






This book challenged my imagination. I watched the trailer for the movie, and decided not to watch it because it did not match with the way I imagined the world


