New menu at UDI\$





Feeling connected

Welcome back to Term 2 and it was great to see both enthusiastic children and teachers during the first week. In Year 1 and 2 we have made an excellent start on our Unit of Inquiry - "How we organise ourselves."



Our Central Idea

The students were really excited by the introduction of the school model to the Year 1 classroom and it generated a lot of discussion and questions, as we begin to look at the public spaces we use within our school. We developed our map reading skills and went on a tour of the school to identify and later record the different areas of the school we all use. We also rewrote and discussed our Essential Agreements to ensure we work together and to take responsibility within the school.

As a way of understanding the different ways and places in which we connect, students shared stories from their Christmas break and it was great to hear about the many adventures they had during that time.

Everyone is very excited about our trip to Central Plaza to look at how people use this public spaces to connect with like minded people and the kinds of activities they do. The students will have lunch together and finish off with Ice Skating. I am sure we have many fun pictures to share with you in our next newsletter.

In Year 1 we assessed the progress at the end of our first Busy Ants book and I am proud to say it has been good. Well done Year 1 for making such good progress. We are looking at money at the moment and children are excited to play shop and add up the value of their purchases. A great fun way to practice.

I really want to encourage more reading practice this term and have increased the amount of books which children can take home to practice specific reading skills. The students are now able to do basic blending and with the introduction of phonics specific reading books this allows them to put this skill into use. The other type of reading book introduced is a sight word specific reading book to help students master those tricky words. We have been playing a lot of games in the class to reinforce this learning and students are asking for more.

So all in all I feel that in Year 1 we are 'feeling connected'. Connected and responsible for the spaces we use, connected to each other and connected to our learning. A great start to Term 2.
