#### Dear Parents

Over the past two weeks, we have been busy preparing for our visit by the Council of International Schools (CIS). A central part of our CIS accreditation is that we have a set of guiding statements that direct the operations of the school. This visit was intended for CIS to check the school against the documentation we had provided CIS and to ensure that we were meeting the necessary requirements to gain CIS candidacy. #### Inquiry corner

Did you know that the IB has three main school programmes? The first level is the PYP (Primary Years Programme) which we offer at UDIS. From there the IB moves into the MYP (Middle Years Programme) and then finishes with the DP (Diploma programme).

The programmes are built upon each other. The main focus in the PYP and the MYP is to gain the skills to think and research on your own. We teach the students information during this time but the main focus is on their skills.

The DP programme is when we get into a lot of material with the kids. The students look more specifically at information to process. DP students have shown to be able to perform at a high level and are ready to get into college. If you have certain colleges in mind for your child you may want to see how they align with the IB. Some students are able to transfer their high school credits into college courses.

Not all students may choose to go the DP route. Every school should offer DP as a possible graduation certificate but also making a general diploma available for students who may not want to push through the DP curriculum.

# K1 class update - People who help us

Students are starting to understand why images that each of us see in our environment all tell us something. Our new unit is focusing on the Central Idea of Images communicate ideas and information. We have started to inquire into various images and their meaning to us. Some examples of images are logos, store names and common advertisements. These real life examples help us explore ideas and how we interpret information.



#### Year 5/6 class update - Civilisations past and present By Ms Susan Mitchell, Y5/6 Teacher

Our second unit of inquiry is well underway and questions are forming around the differences between past, present and future, the idea of civilisation, its traits, artifacts and the notion of archaeology. Year 5/6 students are starting to develop understandings about the central idea; evidence of past civilisations can be used to make connections to present day society. They have been exploring the past through a time capsule exploration, geographic location of artifacts throughout the world, consideration of traits of civilisations and brainstorming of questions to compare and contrast past, present and potential future aspects of civilisations.

Year 5/6 students have also been solidifying some of their spelling, vocabulary, grammar and oral debating skills. In small groups they have been thinking about the way they decode words and the strategies they use to spell them, as well as the meaning they give words based on their understanding of the prefixes and roots. They have been formulating ideas about opinion, fact, similarities, differences and summary of points to support a particular position.

If your child is not feeling well we kindly ask that you keep them home until they are no longer contagious. The school nurse is always available to chat about these concerns with parents.






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### PTA Update

On Wednesday 9 November the PTA held its second meeting of the year. At the meeting, the school discussed issues from the previous meetings and the actions the school had taken to resolve these. These included payment of fees, late payment charges, supervision of students after school, development of a parent's cafe, agenda translation, toilets before school opens, late cards, swimming pool maintenance, judder bars and no-smoking areas. The presentation of school solutions did not receive much feedback from parents so the school will consider feedback forms or other ways of eliciting more feedback in the future.

There were also some unresolved issues including combining all extra fees into material fees, parent cards and early entry into the school. No other solutions were discussed for these issues so it was suggested that we could come back to these at the end of the year for consideration next year. We briefly discussed uniforms and the desire that these were worn consistently by all students. We also briefly discussed sports and music and it was suggested that the school could notify students who had a particular aptitude for an instrument/sport which could be followed up outside of school. The school could also look to provide more music and sport opportunities for students too.

Finally, there was some discussion about academic standards and the learning the students were expected to achieve at each level. The school said that this was a good topic to get further into at the next PTA meeting. This would help give parents more information before the reports and Term 1 parent-teacher conferences. There was also discussion about the level of English within the class with EY parents concerned about the preparation for primary.



This year, we have introduced a House system at the school comprising five house teams. Students have been placed into these teams and able to gain points from classroom activities and school events.
