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## Message from the Head of School

#### Dear Parents

This week the school has been looking at how we define high quality learning at UDIS. This is important for us as a school to develop a clear vision for quality learning and defined practices that support student achievement at UDIS.

We met on Tuesday, and working as individuals and groups, came up with commonalities around three central questions; what is high quality learning? What teacher practices encourage high quality learning? And how can we determine that students are learning at a high level?



The following statement reflects this discussion about what the group came up with:

At UDIS, high quality learning means learning which is goal focused, student initiated and led, where students are actively engaged, motivated and responsible for their learning and which involves critical thinking skills such as evaluation, synthesis and cognition within a teacher supported, active environment.

Over the rest of the year, we will be developing and refining this statement. This will then be used to develop procedures and measures within the school to show how this statement is being met by students on a regular basis.

## K1 class update - Investigating Materials

For our current UOI 'How the World Works' the big idea we will be working on for the next few weeks will be "Many products go through a process of change before they are used or consumed." Under this central idea students will be learning about where materials come from and how they can be used. We began the unit by going on a material hunt around the school where most students were able to identify the materials objects were made from (wood, metal, plastic and glass).

We read the story of "The Three Little Pigs" and the students were inspired to see what material would be best to make a house for the pigs which would keep them safe from the Big Bad Wolf! They devised a 'blow' test, which went down really well with the students and we discovered that wooden blocks worked the best of the materials we tried. We will find a time next week to reflect on why we think this was the case.

## Health and Safety

This week the K1 class closed for two cases of Hand Foot and Mouth disease (HFMD). When children come down with illness and disease it is important that the school know as soon as possible so that we can take action. Here is some more information about this disease.

#### What is hand, foot and mouth disease (HFMD)?

Despite its scary name, hand, foot, and mouth disease is a common, contagious illness caused by different viruses. It typically affects infants and children under age 5, but older kids and adults can catch it as well. Hand, foot and mouth disease can be unpleasant, but it will usually clear up by itself within 7 to 10 days. You can normally look after yourself or your child at home.

#### What are the signs and symptoms?

From the time the child is exposed to hand, foot, and mouth disease, it takes 3 to 6 days for the first symptoms to show up. It usually starts with a fever, sore throat, and runny nose — much like the common cold — but then a rash with tiny blisters may start to show up on the following body sites:

#### In the mouth

- On the inner cheeks
- Gums
- Sides of the tongue
- Top of the mouth

#### **Fingers**

#### Palms of hands

#### Soles of feet

#### How is it spread?

The virus is spread by coughs and sneezes, and is also found in the faeces of infected children. Some children infected with the virus do not have symptoms but can still pass it to others.

#### Is there any treatment?

There is no specific treatment for hand, foot and mouth disease – it is usually a mild and self-limiting illness. If a child feels unwell paracetamol may help. Antibiotics and creams or ointments for the blisters are not effective. Children recover just as quickly without them.

#### How long are children infectious?

Children who are ill are infectious. Also they may carry the virus in their faeces for many weeks after they have recovered and so can continue to pass on infection.




## House Update

Yellow House Mother Teresa	248




#### Yearbook 2016/2017 Advertising Rates
