All classes are now starting their third Unit which is posted outside the front office. The Early Years will be inquiring into their Unit for 10 weeks while the Primary Years will be inquiring into their Unit for roughly 5 to 6 weeks. The teachers have begun their new Units with some wonderful provocations this week.

Please remember at home the ways in which you can support inquiry. Having students wondering about the world and their lives helps to drive the inquiry process. Asking students questions they may need to ponder (i.e. why is the sky blue? Why do you think we have hair on top of our heads?), is a great way to stimulate student's thinking and inquiry. Also it is okay to not always have the answers, it is the process of pondering and discussing possible answers, rather than the answers themselves, which is of value.

#### Preschool class update - Little Explorers

This term, Preschool students will explore all kinds of natural resources in the Earth's environment. We will strive to be real inquirers and to learn how natural resources can be changed through different kinds of scientific experiments and observations. During the first week of this term, our class had lots of fun learning about the properties of water and rocks. Everyone enjoyed playing at the water wall that was constructed by our Early Years team. We are excited to develop the outdoor school area further and to make different stations where children can play and experiment with natural materials. The Early Years teachers are also looking at creating a sound wall on the school playground. We kindly ask everyone who has old pots, pans, metallic cans, baking trays or other unwanted kitchen utilities and metal objects to bring those to school. Using these, our students will be happy to explore the different sounds they can make with these objects.

**Thames:** 'I went to Nom Square. I saw a train, fish, big and small fish....' **Majin:** 'M is for Majin!' (when she saw the letter 'M' on the alphabet mat).

Junior: - Did you go to a zoo? - Yes. - What did you see? - Animals, iguana, train...

# Year 1 class update




# English as an additional language (EAL)

#### Health and Safety

In the interest of keeping our students safe and healthy we ask that parents keep their children home while they are contagious. Different diseases are contagious for different amounts of time. Please refer to the following document to see how long children need to stay home if they fall ill.

Condition	Exclusion period	
Antibiotics prescribed	Should stay at home for the first 2 days of the course and until the fever has subsided	
Bad cough, heavy cold with dark mucous	Should stay at home until the mucous has cleared up and the coughing has subsided	
Bronchitis	Should be excluded until the child has been given appropriate treatment and feels well	
Temperature	If sent home ill, child must be off for 24 hours. They may return after this time if the temperature has returned to normal (without medication controlling the temperature)	
Vomiting	If sent home ill, child must be off for at least 24 hours after the last bout of vomiting.	
Sickness/Diarrhea	Should stay off until at least 48 hours have elapsed from the last bout and they are eating normally again	
Infective (Bacterial) Conjunctivitis (pink eye)	Should be treated with antibiotics, oral, drops or ointment, and the child should be kept at home for at least 48 hours. Can return when eyes are no longer weeping.	
Nonbacterial (allergic) conjunctivitis	A child with red eyes and clear watery discharge doesn't need antibiotics or to be excluded	
Chickenpox and Shingles	Should be excluded until all lesions have crusted. There should be no moist sores and the person feels well.	
Gastroenteritis, food poisoning, salmo- nellosis and dysentery	Until authorized by your doctor that it is alright for your child to return to school	
Infective hepatitis	Child should be excluded for 7 days after the onset of jaundice or illness (Doctor's certificate needed)	
Measles	Should be excluded for 7 days after the onset of the rash (Doctor's certificate needed)	
Meningococcal infection	Until recovered from the illness (Doctor's certificate needed)	
Mumps	Until the swelling has subsided	
Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease	The child should be excluded until all blisters have dried up (Doctor's certificate needed)	
Pertussis (whooping cough)	21 days from the onset of paroxysmal cough	
Poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis)	Should be excluded for at least 2 weeks after onset or until declared free from infection by doctor	
Rubella (German Measles)	Should be excluded for 4 days after appearance of the rash or until a medical certificate of recovery is produced	
Scarlet fever and streptococcal infection of the throat	Until appropriate medical treatment has been given and declared free from infection by a Doctor in no care for less than 3 days	
Tuberculosis	Until declared free from infection by a Doctor	
Typhoid fever	Until declared free from infection by a Doctor	
Impetigo	Until the sores are fully healed	
Pediculosis (Head Lice)	Until appropriate treatment has been given and no eggs are present on scalp	
Plantar warts	No exclusion. Should be treated and covered	
Ringworm of the scalp	Until cured	
Ringworm of the body	Seldom necessary to exclude provided effective treatment is being given	
Scabies	Need not be excluded once appropriate treatment has been given	
Diphtheria	Should be excluded until after at least two negative nose and throat swabs and with medical certificate of recovery




## House Update
