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Message from the Head of School

Dear Parents

Since our last newsletter, we held two important meetings at the school which was the 2nd Executive Board meeting and the 5th Parents and Teachers Association (PTA) meeting of this year.

At the Executive School Board meeting held on Friday 3rd of March, the Board discussed a number of topics. The school licensee has formally changed from Mr. Naprasertskul to Miss Pukpo who will now represent both the Licensee and the Representative of the Owner roles on the Board. I presented the mid-year school report to the Board and the Board was very interested in efforts to continue developing marketing at the school. Other



Board members suggested the the school needed to better communicate its differences with other Thai schools and to show the benefits of an international education to its community better. There are opportunities for UDIS to help support the growth of the province as there is a large development project beginning to start in Udon Thani.

The Board also approved the financial statements from the previous academic year. The school's loss for 2015/2016 was about 7 million baht but the losses from 2014/2015 have been reduced which is positive. The Board also approved the revised mission statements that were revised by staff and parents. The Board also looked at the intents of the draft strategic plan which will be developed into a plan by the next meeting. Finally the Board also looked at developing measures for the HOS's accountability for the performance of the school. This will be looked into and developed for the next meeting.

The second important meeting held was our 5th PTA meeting. At the meeting we presented highlights from our recent parent cafe, 'Supporting reading at home' by Miss Emmi and Miss Karyn. The school then looked to survey interest in a possible afterschool club and then looked at that week's mother tongue programme. Finally, parents provided feedback to the school which included; having more international food, naptimes for PY students after lunch, lack of etiquette around display of the King's picture, showers after swimming and the use of hairdryers after swimming. The school will look into these issues and report back to parents at the next meeting.



English as an additional language (EAL)

Stages of Second Language Acquisition

"One generation plants the trees; another gets the shade."

Chinese Proverb

Learning to speak and write one's native language well is often challenging enough; acquiring these skills in a second language requires even more effort, commitment, and practice. Each language has its own set of rules for speaking and writing the language properly, and individuals trying to learn a new language often blur the lines between which set of rules to use. Second language learners also face a certain degree of fear or anxiety about tackling a new language, which can in turn affect how easily or how well they acquire the second language.

Stage I: Pre-production (This is the silent period)

- Is able to copy words from the board.
- Can understand and duplicate gestures and movements to show comprehension.



Stage II: Early production

- Can use short language chunks that have been memorised
- Can usually speak in one- or two-word phrases



Stage III: Speech emergence

- They will ask simple questions, that may or may not be grammatically correct, such as "May I go to bathroom?
- Will understand easy stories read in class with the support of pictures

Stage IV: Intermediate fluency

- Begin to use more complex sentences
- Are willing to share opinions and give feedback on 4 skills.



Stage V: Advanced Fluency

- Will be near-native in their ability to perform in content area learning
- Achieve cognitive academic language proficiency in a second language

























House Update

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
