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Message from the Head of School

Dear Parents

This week, I would like to report back on a few excerpts from the CIS membership report that Jenni Thompson, our CIS membership advisor prepared for us after her visit in November:

Udon Thani International School is a young school, beginning to establish itself in an area of Thailand unfamiliar with the concept of a school that is inquiry-based and seeks to develop an ethos of international mindedness in its predominantly Thai population. This has produced a number of challenges of which the school is aware and beginning to address.



A great deal of the past two years has for the school, by its own admission, been taken up with the development of policies and procedures. As it moves forward, the school now needs to ensure that these are understood by parents and staff alike and consistently applied. The school has a commitment to school improvement and has undertaken the Membership process with CIS with energy and enthusiasm. Although small in number, It is evident the staff are enthusiastic about the school they are creating, and willing to undertake the developmental work required to meet the Preparatory Evaluation standards should the school move forward in the accreditation process.

The school has identified that an important first step is a review of its guiding statements to refine them further and ensure they accurately reflect the context of the school. Time and effort devoted to developing a real understanding of the ethos of the school among all constituents will pay dividends in the long run. The school has identified a number of priorities around curriculum, staff and community development and have prepared a detailed action plan. However, to be truly effective, priorities should be refined to a few key initiatives which, when acted upon will have the optimum effect and ensure the school is progressing forward and not getting caught up in a cycle of constant change.

The school is to be congratulated for being ready to host a Membership Visit so soon after being accepted into the process. This is indicative of its commitment to school improvement and determination to create a high quality school.

Early Years Update

K1 class update - Expressing our feelings By Ms Jennifer Chapman , K1 Teacher

K1 have started our new Unit of Inquiry 'How we express ourselves' and are learning about different ways we can show our feelings and ideas. We started by looking at feelings and what can make us feel that way. We have made lots of connections to characters in stories and loved talking selfies to show our feelings! K1 have really enjoyed expressing themselves through listening to music and dancing. We have also started meditation and yoga to help us feel calm and reflect on the day.



Year 2/3 class update - Our bodies and wellness By Ms Emmi Hines Year 2/3 Teacher

This unit we have explored how our body and mind are affected by the everyday choices that we make. We have learned about the meaning of a good diet, keeping fit, good hygiene, and the importance of play and rest. We have investigated the food groups and how food provides us with the nutrition and energy to carry out our daily activities. We have read books about healthy living and discussed how these relate to our own lives.

There has been plenty of opportunities for the children to use their bodies in an active way as we explored different types of wellness. Next week, for the summative assessment, students will work out a lunch menu that shows what they have learned about healthy choices and the food pyramid. Each student will be able to plan and cook their own lunch for their classmates.



During this unit students have been inquiring into why conflicts arise and strategies that can be used to reach a resolution. We started off by looking at different levels of conflict from person to person, person to self and person to nature through the story of The Lorax, then inquired into the Trojan War and the continuing conflict about the need for zoos. For our summative assessment, students are investigating possibly the biggest conflict of all time, World War 2. Students will take on the role of one of the leaders and explain their wants and needs throughout the conflict. They will also consider ways in which the conflict could have been resolved sooner or avoided altogether - lessons from history.

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
Language and Culture




Yearbook 2016/2017 Advertising Rates
