Planning for inquiry based learning

Here, in my second article on inquiry, I'd like to continue with the theme of the last one. In that first article I invited readers to think back to their experiences of primary education. I pointed out that most of us did a lot of copying from books and listening to teachers talking. This kind of traditional teaching does not enable students to develop deep and enduring understandings. Now let's think back to all of those occasions when the teacher stood at the front and talked about things that we already knew. Oh, how boring that was! Then there were those times when the teacher introduced topics which we had no prior knowledge of. Do you remember feeling frustrated because the content was too difficult?



Allowing children to learn at a level that is good for them and allowing them to engage in their own inquiries involves a particular kind of planning. It is our aim here at UDIS to find out what the students already know before we start teaching new content. This is a stage of planning we call 'Tuning In'. It is very important to us as teachers to engage students at just the right level of challenge. We don't want to repeat what they already know, neither do we want to make them feel worried because they know nothing about the topic. The aim is to engage each child at their own level of understanding. A unit of inquiry will therefore begin with an activity which is intended to capture the attention of the class, get them talking and demonstrating what they already know. Here's an example:

I recently had a Year four class and our unit of inquiry was about how the systems of the human body work together. As my tuning in activity I asked a local butcher to provide me the internal organs of a pig. I asked that he kept them connected together as much as possible. As you see in the photograph, these students were fascinated and spent most of an afternoon handling the organs, cutting them open and asking one another endless questions about what they saw. As the teacher, I listened to their questions and made a list of the most significant ones. These were then written on the whiteboard. Those questions were organised into categories or lines of inquiry and they became a central part of our unit of inquiry.

The interesting point here is that I did not begin to study biology until midway through secondary school. Throughout the whole of the Advanced level course, I never actually handled any of the organisms I read about. No, I simply read about them! I took notes from just one book. I memorised the notes and copied diagrammes from the book. The students in the photograph above were only nine years of age. At the conclusion of six weeks of study they were able to explain the basic form and function of the human digestive system, the circulatory system or the muscular & skeletal system. I am completely confident that



those nine year olds still have an enduring understanding of those systems. This is because the activity thrilled them, it sparked lots of questions in their minds and they were given freedom to simply explore

As the teacher, I engaged in discussion to assess their understanding of what they were handing, and then they were asked to research answers to the questions that they themselves had asked. That is the heart of inquiry based learning.

This research will help develop sentence structure and organisation of their thoughts. We have also been using Mathematics to incorporate place values of 3-digit numbers, ordering numbers in various ways and quick recall of simple subtraction problems.
